

# School begins with Peace





For the beginning of this school year, we have chosen the theme of peace, as part of our focus on peace education which is part of our mission here at AES.

Peace is an especially important topic this year because of the growing violent conflict in Syria, which is alarming to us all.

The following events, explained in the sections below, focused on peace.

## First Week of School Events

### Kindergarten



Here at AES we have two Kindergarten classes. Kindergarten Grade 1 (KG1) is for 4 year olds, and Kindergarten Grade 2 (KG2) is for 5 year olds.

To celebrate the first day of kindergarten, the students were given popcorn. They had a lot of fun eating it in the court yard. After that, the kindergarteners began with their lessons: singing, crafts, coloring, dancing, English, Arabic, and religion. Later in the week, they made jello together. The children saw how it is made.

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### • School

The problematic situation in Syria prompted us to give the students an introduction to ways of handling various emergency situations. For example, they were shown how to use gas masks. We decided to do this so that the students are prepared, and can help each other, in case of an emergency. Two teachers developed the introduction.



In order to remember and support our brothers and sisters whose lives are affected by the conflict in Syria, the school fasted for a day. During the early morning celebration Reverend Samir Esaid began the day of fasting by praying for peace in Syria and the safety of all the nation's residents and those who have fled to other countries. Fasting was on a voluntary basis for the students, but everyone prayed together for those affected by the violence. We continue to hope and pray for peace in Syria.

### Parent-Teacher Meeting

On Saturday morning there was a meeting for the kindergarteners' and the students' parents. The meeting was planned especially for the new students, but all of the parents were invited.

Headmistress Sabah Zurikat introduced all the teachers and the German volunteers. The parents were told of the mission and the vision of the school, and introduced the concept of peace education. This was done to give the parents a better understanding of their children's lives at the school and the aims of the school so that they can include these goals in their home lives. The importance of integration of the blind and low vision students with the sited students was also discussed in the meeting.

Afterwards, the parents were able to mingle amongst themselves and with the teachers and administrators.

### Awards Ceremony

On the same evening as the Parents' Meeting, the students with the highest grades on their report cards received awards. The top four students in each class received award, these students all at least 90 out of 100 points on their report cards. All in all 46 students received awards.

The ceremony began with a procession the students, in front of their applauding parents. Headmistress Sabah Zurikat and Reverend Samir Esaid gave a speech praising the students for their hard work and their achievement, while encouraging them to continue in this fashion.





• Trip to Petra Short




One of the famous sites in Petra

On August 21<sup>st</sup>, 40 teachers and members of the congregations set off in two buses to Petra. The group took a three hour long tour of the ancient, stone carved city. Everyone was impressed by the beauty of this unique wonder. There was a lot for everyone to discover, even for those for whom this was not their first visit to Petra. The group spent the night in a hotel in the town of Petra.

AES subsidized the price of the trip, because the school administrators believe that it is important for the teachers to re-energize themselves and to develop a sense of comradery. The time they spent together will stay with them for a long time.





## Our New Bus





After a half year of work, the new, smaller, 14 passenger, school bus has arrived! We have used it since the beginning of the school year. Thank you to Landeskirche Wuerttemberg of Germany for your financial support. They covered the cost of 70% of the bus; the rest was covered by the school. Normally, school buses are tax exempt, but since we are a private school we are not part of this exemption so the school had to pay more than originally expected.

The new bus is for transportation of students, especially for the blind and low vision students. The old buses were sometimes too big for the little streets in Irbid, which made it so that some students had to meet the bus farther from their homes. Now, we are happy that the students have an easier and safer way to get to school.

Our deepest gratitude to Landeskirche Wuerttemberg, if it was not for their support we would not have been able to afford this bus.


